



Every week since its inauguration, the local Movie Buffs Associated have shown a series of movies chosen by a selection panel, determined annually by a ballot of members, in the Municipal Offices function room each evening from Monday to Friday, and starring a particular actor/actress. The selection panel for the current year is Sally Boyden, Mark Thomson, Jessica Farmer, Laurie Davison and Mary Peters.

Last week their choice was Michael Caine, and the films chosen - one per member - were The Dark Knight (2008), Inception (2010), The Prestige (2006), The Italian Job (1969), and Zulu (1964) but not respectively, and neither were they shown in that order, nor in the order in which they were released. Showing time differed each evening. From this information and the following clues, for each member, can you determine who chose which film, the day on which it was shown, and at what time?

1. The 2010 release was shown either on Friday or at 8:20 pm.
 2. The Prestige was shown three days after Jessica's choice.
 3. Two of the women had consecutive days showings with one being at 8:25 pm and the other the 1969 release.
 4. Mary chose neither The Dark Knight nor Zulu.
5. Miss Farmer's choice was not shown on Tuesday or Wednesday.
 6. Miss Boyden's choice closed the week with the 8:00 pm showing.
 7. The 2008 release was preceded by Laurie's choice which was shown at 8:30 pm.
